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Grantmaking - General Information

1. The Trustees have established no set form for grant applications. The application should include a concise statement of the project according to the requirements described in the "Applying for a Grant" section of the El Pomar Foundation website. The Foundation is limited to providing grant support to Colorado nonprofit organizations and activities that take place within the State of Colorado. One copy of the grant proposal should be sent to: Board of Trustees, El Pomar Foundation, 10 Lake Circle, Colorado Springs, CO 80906.

2. For capital projects of \$250,000 and greater, the Trustees will consider capital grant requests not to exceed the lesser of:

- a.) 20% of the total campaign project cost or
- b.) an amount no greater than the single largest grant, contribution, or donation received from private sources (excluding government funds) to include foundations, corporations or individuals.

Due to the tremendous need throughout the state of Colorado, capital grant requests, if funded, may be funded at lesser levels than requested.

3. The Foundation does not accept grant applications for grant support to:

- Other foundations or nonprofits that distribute money to recipients of its own selection
- Endowments
- Individuals
- Organizations that practice discrimination of any kind
- Organizations that do not have fiscal responsibility for the proposed project
- Organizations that do not have an active 501(c)(3) nonprofit IRS determination letter
- Camps, camp programs, or other seasonal activities
- Religious organizations for support of religious programs
- Cover deficits or debt elimination
- Cover travel, conferences, conventions, group meetings, or seminars
- Influence legislation or support candidates for political office
- Produce videos or other media projects
- Fund research projects or studies
- Primary or secondary schools (K-12). El Pomar will consider, on a limited basis, capital

requests from nonpublicly funded secondary schools

4. Foundation policy discourages interviews with Trustees collectively or individually either before or after application submittal. Any discussions or indication of interest prior to or after submission of a written application or onsite visit should not be construed as a commitment by the Foundation. Each application will be considered on its own merit and accepted or rejected only in writing. Written requests are thoroughly reviewed by the Trustees. Follow-up conversations and/or site visits by Foundation representatives may be requested. A final decision is reached after discussion and a majority vote of the Board.

5. The Trustees' action on an application is final. The application as presented will not be given further consideration. However, an applicant may submit a new application not sooner than 12 months following the grant denial letter. A new application should not request reinstatement of a prior request. An applicant's proposal that has been approved for funding is eligible to submit a new application 36 months from the date of the grant award letter or one year from the date of the last payment on the grant, whichever is later.

6. The Foundation's grant program is subject to the provisions of the Tax Reform Act of 1969, which imposes restrictions on program activities, operating methods, and financial practices of private foundations. The Act requires detailed reports, record keeping, and expenditure responsibility, which contributes to the volume and type of information required in making application and accounting for all grants.

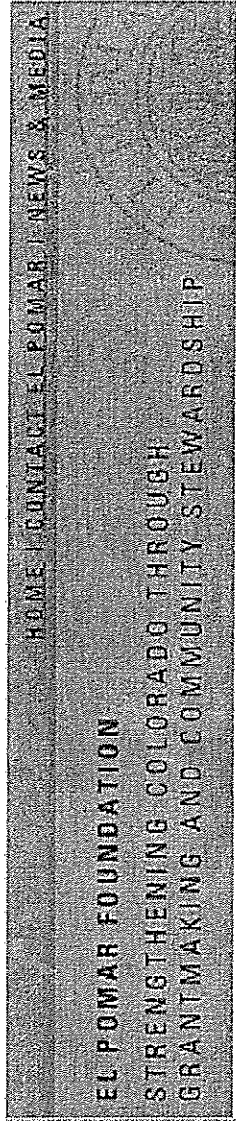
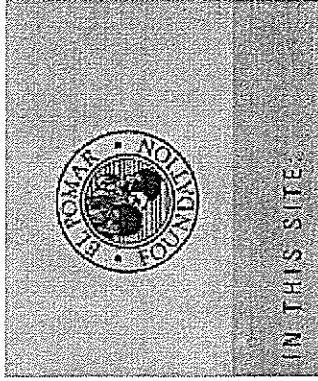

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The Foundation has no formal grant application forms. Please submit one original of the grant proposal including the following information:

1. Name and address of tax exempt organization.
2. A brief history of the organization, its mission, principal programs, and accomplishments.
3. A concise statement describing the purpose of the request and the amount requested. Outline the need for the project, the specific solutions to be reached, the expected contributions to the population served, and the criteria for measuring the success of the project.
4. An organization budget for the current year, and documented budget of the project for the proposed term of the grant. (For technology requests, see specific budget requirements in Item 5 below). Please include the total amount to be raised and a list of expected sources of funds. If the request is for a program, indicate how the organization plans to fund the program once El Pomar Foundation funding ceases.

5. An application to fund a technology project must clearly state how the project will benefit the functioning of the nonprofit organization. Categories for funding technology items that will benefit the operation and/or management of the nonprofit organization's program(s) include:

- Software applications
- Computers and peripheral devices
- Network equipment
- Internetworking equipment
- Projects may also be a combination of any of the above

Note: Funding for the development of custom software and/or web sites will not be considered.

The grant application for a technology project should include:

- Itemization of equipment and/or software, including a description and purchase price
- Implementation costs, such as installation, consulting or training

- Description of project implementation, including timeline for installation and training (if required)
6. A statement of whether aid has been sought during the preceding three years from other foundations and, if so, the names of the foundations and the amount, if any, received from each.
7. Applicants should furnish:
- Relationship and capacity of person signing application
 - A list of governing body members, such as board of directors
 - Statement of grant request approval by the applicant's governing body
 - Endorsement of outside authorities, and copies of regulatory agency approvals, if appropriate
 - Organization's three most recent years of audited financial statements, and latest IRS Form 990
 - Copy of current IRS determination letter showing tax exempt status under Section 501 (c)(3) and public charity status under Section 509(a) of the Internal Revenue Code
8. Applicants should furnish up to three pictures (photographs, architectural renderings, images from an existing publication, etc.) that portray the specific project or general operations of the organization. Pictures will be used in the presentation to the Board of Trustees. Applicants should not incur any costs related to this request. El Pomar Foundation will retain the photographs unless their return is requested by the organization.
9. If a grant is made, the Foundation requires the recipient to report expended grant funds and to return to the Foundation any excess not used for the grant.
10. Do not use plaques or memorials relating to El Pomar Foundation without the Foundation's approval. We request that you not use the names of Foundation Officers and Trustees in any public statements.
11. Proposals may be submitted at any time and will be considered by the Trustees based upon the date of their receipt at the Foundation. In order to ensure that each proposal receives sufficient consideration, the number of proposals reviewed at each Trustees' meeting will be limited. El Pomar will confirm receipt of your proposal in writing, normally within 14 days of receipt, and indicate the date of the Trustees' meeting at which your proposal will be considered.

FEDERAL AGENCY

RURAL HOUSING SERVICE (RHS), DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

AUTHORIZATION

Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act, as amended, Section 306, Public Law 92-419, 7 U.S.C. 1926.

OBJECTIVES

To construct, enlarge, extend, or otherwise improve community facilities providing essential services to rural residents.

TYPES OF ASSISTANCE

Guaranteed/Insured Loans; Direct Loans; Project Grants.

USES AND USE RESTRICTIONS

Community facilities include but are not limited to those providing or supporting overall community development such as child care facilities, food recovery and distribution centers; assisted-living facilities; group homes, mental health clinics, and shelters; and education facilities. Projects comprise, community, social, cultural, transportation, industrial park sites, fire and rescue services, access ways, and utility extensions. All facilities financed in whole or in part with RHS funds shall be for public use.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Applicant Eligibility

City, county, and State agencies; political and quasi-political subdivisions of States and associations, including corporations, Indian tribes on Federal and State reservations and other federally recognized Indian tribes; and existing private corporations which: (1) are operated on a not-for-profit basis; (2) have or will have the legal authority necessary for constructing, operating, and maintaining the proposed facility or service and for obtaining, giving security for, and repaying the loan; and (3) are unable to finance the proposed project from its own resources or through commercial credit at reasonable rates and terms. Assistance is authorized for eligible applicants in rural areas of the States, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, the commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, the Marshall Islands, the Republic of Palaw, and the Federated States of Micronesia.

Beneficiary Eligibility

Farmers, ranchers, rural residents, rural businesses, and other users of such public facilities in eligible applicant areas as set out above.

Credentials/Documentation

Evidence of legal capacity and financial responsibility of the applicants and the economic feasibility of the project relative to the activity for which assistance is requested. This program is excluded from coverage under OMB Circular No. A-87.

APPLICATION AND AWARD PROCESS

Preapplication Coordination

The standard application forms as provided by the Federal agency and required by OMB Circular No. A-102 must be used for this program. An environmental assessment is required for this program. This program is eligible for coverage under E.O. 12372, "Intergovernmental Review of Federal Programs." An applicant should consult the office or official designated as the single point of contact in his or her State for more information on the process the State requires in applying for assistance if the State has selected the project for review.

Application Procedure

Preapplication Form SF-424 is filed at the local Rural Development district office from which assistance may be obtained. This program is subject to the provisions of OMB Circular No. A-110.

Award Procedure

After the preapplication has been reviewed by the Rural Development Area Office, it is forwarded to the Rural Development State Office for review and processing instructions. Following review by the State Office, the applicant is notified about eligibility, availability of funds, and if an application should be filed. Upon completion of application processing requirements and approval by the State Office, funds are made available to the Rural Development Area Office for delivery.

Deadlines

None.

Range of Approval/Disapproval Time

From 30 to 90 days.

Appeals

If an application is rejected, the reasons for rejection are fully stated. The applicant may request a review of the decision from the next higher management level of Rural Development.

Renewals

Not applicable.

ASSISTANCE CONSIDERATIONS

Formula and Matching Requirements

Matching funds are not required but may be used in connection with the funds provided from the applicant or other sources. Funds are allocated to States based upon rural population and number of households below the poverty level. The statistical factor for eligibility is towns or incorporated areas under 20,000 population for direct and guaranteed loans and 20,000 population for grants. The source is "Latest Decennial Census." This program has no statutory formula.

Length and Time Phasing of Assistance

A time limitation is not specified for the use of RHS loan or grant funds. Funds will be awarded when all RHS requirements are met and the project can be completed on a timely basis. Funds may be advanced on an as needed basis by RHS to cover expenses for a 30-day period.

POST ASSISTANCE REQUIREMENTS

Reports

Periodic reports are made to RHS. Each borrower will monitor and report to RHS on actual performance during the construction of each project financed, or to be financed, in whole or in part with RHS loan funds.

Audits

Periodic audits should be made as part of the recipient's system of financial management and internal control to meet terms and conditions of loans and other agreements. In accordance with the provisions of 7 CFR Part 3052, "Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations," which implement OMB Circular No. A-133 (Revised, June 27, 2003), "Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations," nonfederal entities that receive financial assistance of \$500,000 or more in Federal awards will have a single or a program-specific audit conducted for that year. Nonfederal entities that expend less than \$500,000 a year in Federal awards are exempt from Federal audit requirements for that year, except as noted in 7 CFR 3052.

Records

The borrower must maintain adequate records and accounts of the operation of the facility developed.

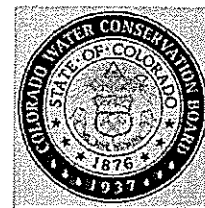

An Open Letter to Water Organizations in Colorado;

This letter is to inform you about **low interest loans** available from the Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCB). These loans can be used for new construction or rehabilitation of raw water storage facilities and delivery systems. Treated water systems are not eligible for funding.

In 2005 approximately \$60 million is available for new loans. Loan requests under \$5 million must be submitted with a completed Loan Feasibility Study approximately two months prior to the bi-monthly Board Meeting. Loan requests greater than \$5 million must be submitted by August 31st with a completed Loan Feasibility Study for approval by CWCB and by Colorado Legislators for funds available the following July.

The CWCB Construction Fund 2005/2006 Loan Rates for a 30-year term are:

Agricultural	2.5 %
Municipal	3.25 % (Low) / 3.75 % (Med.) / 4.25 % (High Income)
Commercial	5.25 %

(Rates reduce by 0.25% for 20-year loans, and by 0.5% for 10-year loans.)

The CWCB financial participation is limited to 90 percent of the total engineering and construction costs.

Loan requests require a Loan Feasibility Study that is in compliance with the CWCB Loan Program procedures. The CWCB may have grants available for 50 percent of the cost of a feasibility study with a maximum of \$5,000 in assistance.

The drought conditions currently affecting Colorado highlight the need to effectively manage and develop Colorado's water resources. In addition to new storage facilities, rehabilitation or expansion of water storage reservoirs could provide a much-needed increase in Colorado's water storage capacity.

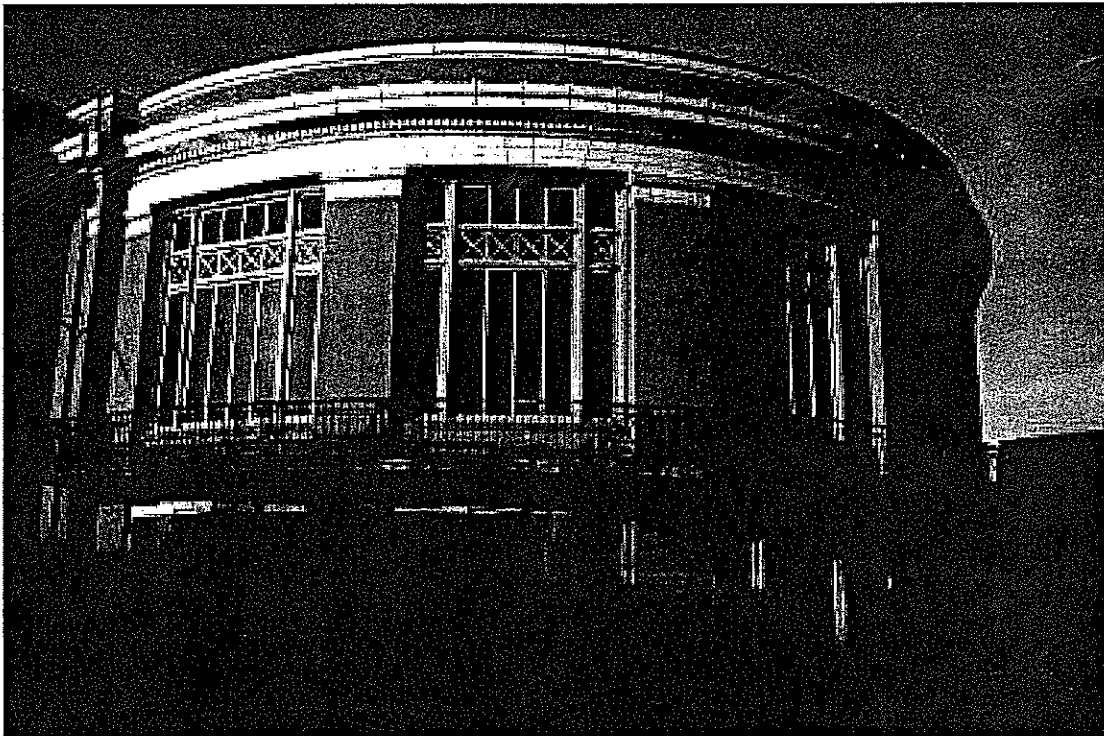

CHF Revolving Loan Fund

New resources for historical preservation

In an effort to leverage the current resources available for historic preservation, the Colorado Historical Foundation created the CHF Revolving Loan Fund. The Loan Fund partners with the State Historical Fund by providing grant recipients an additional source of funding for historic preservation in the form of low-interest rate loans.

The Loan Fund is intended to become a permanent and self-sufficient source of capital funds for historic preservation projects in Colorado. The Loan Fund is managed in partnership with the State Historical Fund and the Colorado Housing and Finance Authority (CHFA), which acts as the fiscal agent responsible for evaluating risk as well as closing and servicing all loans.

What is the benefit to using the loan funds?

The Loan Fund provides below-market fixed rates to supplement Historical Fund grants. The loans typically require minimal down payments and are structured with flexible repayment terms.

Who is eligible to apply?

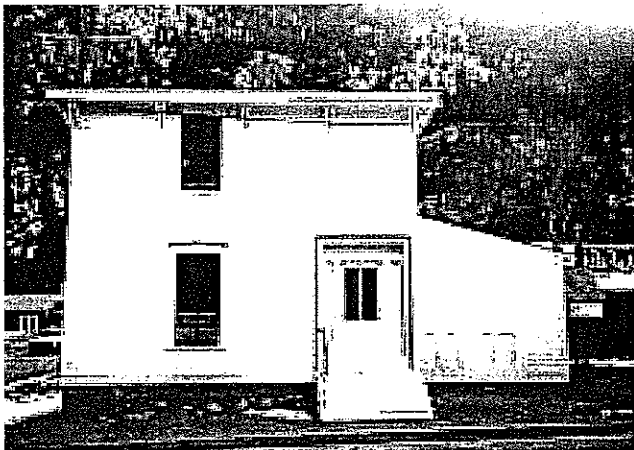
All State Historical Fund grant recipients are eligible to apply for loans (including both non-profit and public entities). In addition, loans may also be made directly to private individuals and for-profit owners of historic properties receiving State Historical Fund Grants.



What are the eligible uses of the loan funds?

Loans may be made only for costs eligible for funding by the State Historical Fund as demonstrated by such costs being included in the scope of work of a currently active or immediately pending State Historical Fund grant award contract. Eligible loan structures include:

- ❖ Construction loans to rehabilitate a designated historic property.
- ❖ Bridge loans to cover cash shortfalls due to the timing of the receipt of specified funds related to an active State Historical Fund grant contract.



What are the loan terms?

The Loan Fund offers fixed-rate, secured loans up to five years, for projects having an active or immediately pending State Historical Fund grant award contract. Loan terms are flexible and dependent upon project and borrower needs. Interest rates are negotiable but attractive (at or below prime). Repayment schedules are flexible and the loans may be prepaid at any time without penalty.

Are the loans secured?

The loans will typically be secured by a lien on the property that is receiving the benefit of the improvements. Additionally, majority owners will be expected to provide a personal guaranty on the loan.

What is the maximum and minimum loan size?

Although there are no minimum or maximum loan amounts, loans of less than \$100,000 or over \$750,000 will be considered only under unusual circumstances.

PURPOSE:

Loans and grants for water, wastewater, and storm water projects in rural areas and communities under 10,000 population.

AREAS OF INTEREST:

Priority will be given to applicants in areas smaller than 5,500 people with deteriorating water supply or inadequate facilities. Preference will also be given to projects in which small facilities would be merged and those serving low-income areas.

RESTRICTIONS:

Loans and grants are available to local governments, special purpose districts, nonprofit corporations, and tribal governments. Applicants must have the legal authority to borrow and repay loans, to pledge security for loans, and to construct, operate, and maintain the facilities.

Repayment of the loan must be based on tax assessments, revenues, fees, or other sources of money sufficient for operation and maintenance, reserves, and debt retirement. The maximum term for a loan is 40 years.

APPLICATION PROCESS:

Applicants are handled through the Lakewood Rural Development office. Staff will provide application materials and current program information and assist in the preparation of an application.

PROPOSED DEADLINES:

Ongoing.
